MESSAGE FROM THE CEO

The past year has been one of growth and progress as Groundwork Jacksonville evolves to increase our capacity and impact. We accomplished so much, and I am especially proud of these significant achievements:

Added new staff in development, community engagement, operations and trail maintenance;

Trained and hired our first Emerald Trail Stewards;

Helped North Riverside CDC establish a successful home repair program;

Began work with residents of 10 Emerald Trail neighborhoods on a watershed plan;

Received all the funding needed to complete the Hogans Creek restoration design with grant awards from NOAA and NFWF;

Secured \$10.3M to fund the construction of the McCoys Creek Branches (the headwaters);

Executed MOU with the City of Jacksonville and JTA for Emerald Trail segments 3, 4, 6, 7 and 8;

Expanded the CREST program to include Hogans Creek neighborhoods; and,

Joined the High Line Network of signature parks and trails throughout the country.

In just four years since the trail master plan was adopted by the Jacksonville City Council, 40% of the Emerald Trail is complete, under construction or in design. It is thanks to our devoted employees, dedicated Board of Directors, collaborative partners and especially, our generous donors that we can accomplish this ambitious work.

I am incredibly grateful for our partner, the City of Jacksonville, and Mayor Donna Deegan's shared vision of a vibrant, connected urban core that welcomes and benefits all people. Our partnership with the City and now also with JTA, exemplifies what can be accomplished when the public and private sectors work collaboratively to achieve a common, community-focused goal.

VISION

The Emerald Trail is a nationally recognized centerpiece attracting people to Jacksonville. It connects urban core neighborhoods that are valued as vital and desirable places to live, work, and visit. Jacksonville's urban core neighborhoods are economically diverse and economically healthy.

Urban core neighborhoods have a community ethic of active living and an outdoor orientation. Working together, neighbors are engaged in creating and sustaining their clean environment.

EMERALD TRAIL

The Emerald Trail is a 34-mile trail and linear park system connecting 14 urban neighborhoods to downtown, Hogans Creek, McCoys Creek and the St. Johns River.

The trail will become Jacksonville's signature destination and a catalyst for social and economic development, transforming downtown into a vibrant, resilient, walkable community by directly linking 16 schools, two colleges, three hospitals, 21 parks, and the regional Transportation Center to destinations like restaurants, shops, businesses and other points of interest.

Expected benefits include community connections, encouraging healthy outdoor activities, safe transportation to school and work, and spurring economic growth and neighborhood revitalization. In addition, we conservatively estimate a carbon reduction of 338,304 pounds per year with the addition of more than 7,000 trees.

The Emerald Trail's goals align with each Rotary focus area: Peace and

Making Tracks With Swisher

Swisher, a family-owned company headquartered in Jacksonville, committed \$500,000 to be the presenting sponsor of the S-Line Rail Trail. The donation was part of Swisher's commitment to invest at least \$1 million in community

causes and philanthropic initiatives in 2023 focused on supporting our nation's heroes and families; community health and wellbeing; community revitalization; and higher education.

The 4.8-mile S-Line was an abandoned length of CSX railroad Right-of-Way that the City of Jacksonville gained possession of in 2008. The S-Line begins at State Street where it connects to the northern end of the LaVilla Link, and continues northeast through Durkeeville and Springfield

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ending in Brentwood behind Norwood Plaza. Approximately 1.3 miles of the S-Line—from 12th Street and Boulevard, near Andrew Robinson Elementary School to E. 21st Street—remain unfinished and will be completed as part of the Emerald Trail project.

Emerald Trail Stewards Program Launches

With our partners at the Florida Nursery, Growers & Landscape Association (FNGLA), University of North Florida (UNF)
Botanical Gardens, Liberty Landscape Supply and Career Source of NE Florida, Groundwork Jacksonville trained and
hired our first Emerald Trail Stewards.



Graduates earned Florida Soft Skills Credentials, Work Ready Level 2 Certificate of Completion, and the FNGLA Horticulture Professional and Landscape Maintenance Technician Certifications.



"THE SUP" Shared Use Path | Complete

Designed and constructed by the Florida Department of Transportation, the new Shared Use Path (SUP) connects the Northbank Riverwalk, the San Marco Link and the 2.3-mile Riverside Link which is currently in the design phase.

Cyclists, walkers, runners and rollerbladers now enjoy stunning river views along a 12-foot wide dedicated path across the Fuller Warren Bridge.

CREEK RESTORATION

As part of the ongoing effort to develop the Emerald Trail project in Jacksonville's urban core, Groundwork Jacksonville has partnered with the City of Jacksonville on the McCoys Creek and Hogans Creek restoration projects. These two urban creeks are listed as the #1 and #2 priority in the COJ's Local Mitigation Strategy, respectively.


Both creeks suffer from years of pollution, failing infrastructure and development that has encroached on their natural flood plains. Both pose severe flooding hazards for nearby roads, homes and businesses even during moderate rainfall.

The ecological restoration of the creeks aims to repair damage and degradation in order to reduce flooding, improve water quality, increase habitat for fish and wildlife, create creek access for active and passive recreation and build resilience through nature-based solutions and green infrastructure.



Design is underway with goal of beginning construction in 2026.





MCCOYS CREEK | In Progress

Phase 1 of the McCoys Creek restoration, between I-95 and King Street, is expected to be complete in fall 2024. Construction has already begun on the outfall at the St. Johns River. Construction is expected to begin on the branches in fall 2024.

Groundwork Jacksonville has had a successful year securing and facilitating major grants for the ecological restoration of Hogans and McCoys creeks. The National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF) awarded Groundwork a \$5.85 million grant from the National Coastal Resilience Fund to complete the design and permitting for Hogans Creek. The project will help reduce current and projected climate threats, improve fish and wildlife habitats, benefit underserved communities, and directly engage community members in the project design and implementation. Projects that NFWF believes can be scaled for broader impact through integration into other government plans, programs, or policies were given preference.

Groundwork also received \$2.95 million from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) for the restoration design of Hogans Creek. The NOAA funds are intended to protect coastal communities and ecosystems from the impacts of climate change and make significant strides in the recovery of threatened and endangered species.

Furthermore, NOAA awarded Groundwork \$2.8 million for the McCoys Creek branches restoration project, covering approximately 25% of the construction cost and funding engagement efforts with residents and stakeholders.

Groundwork also assisted the City of Jacksonville (COJ) in securing a \$5.18 million construction grant through the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) Florida Resilient Coastlines Program. The grant will fund nearly 50% of the McCoys Creek branches construction, while COJ will pay the remaining, approximately 25% of the branches construction costs.

EQUITABLE DEVELOPMENT

Redlining denied people access to credit based on where they lived, even if they were qualified for loans. The Federal Housing Administration (FHA) encouraged redlining from the 1930s until the 1960s. The practice disproportionately discriminated against people of color living within the urban core, the impact of which is still felt today.

Then, in the 1960s, many of these same minority communities fell victim to highway construction. In Jacksonville, I-95 and I-10 bisected urban neighborhoods, forcing many long-time residents from their homes, causing businesses to fail, and limiting safe transportation options for nearly one-third of residents who can't afford a car. Neighborhoods like the once-prosperous Sugar Hill were completely decimated.

The Emerald Trail is a significant infrastructure investment in historically underserved neighborhoods. By reconnecting these neighborhoods to education, healthcare, jobs, recreation, and essential amenities not currently within safe walking distance, we hope to help balance the equity deficit.

Groundwork Jacksonville prioritizes the needs and desires of current residents

in our work. Our goal is always to ensure that long-time residents and small businesses can remain in their neighborhoods and prosper from, not be displaced because of, community revitalization.



UNF Students Learn About Environmental Justice Issues

University of North Florida global environmental justice students, led by Dr.
Charles Closmann, Associate Professor in UNF's History Department, and Dr.
Joshua Geller, Associate Professor in UNF's Political Science Department, toured
North Riverside to learn about environmental justice issues.

Groundwork's Manager of Community Engagement & Equity, Gloria McNair, shared the history of the area and the impacts that redlining, environmental contaminants, flooding, and disinvestment have had on the community.

North Riverside Home Repair Program Helps Preserve Home Ownership

Residents who are already financially stretched have few resources to pay for repairs, leaving them vulnerable to both climate impacts and potential displacement.

Groundwork Jacksonville is working with the North Riverside CDC on a home repair program that will benefit residents in 46 owner-occupied homes. An average of \$20,000 is being invested into each home for repairs including new, cool roofs, structural and/or accessibility upgrades, electrical, plumbing, HVAC systems, mold remediation and exterior beautification.

The home repair program is being funded by a grant from Groundwork USA through the Climate Preparedness and Land Restoration Initiative, made possible with funding from the Bezos Earth Fund, in addition a grant from the Edna Sproull Williams Foundation.

It is being matched by a \$600,000 grant from United Way of Northeast Florida as part of a historic \$20 million gift from philanthropist MacKenzie Scott.

CREST Evolves To Serve More

The CREST program was created as a result of Groundwork's community engagement efforts around the restoration of McCoys Creek. This year, Groundwork expanded the program to also include Hogans Creek neighborhoods.

CREST stands for Community Restoration Environmental Stewardship Training. This unique intergenerational program trains residents of all ages to be environmental stewards with workshops, creek cleanups and field trips. CREST is funded by a grant from Wells Fargo.




