Life on the Trail

From blocks away, visitors are drawn to the LaVilla Link by the bright, dynamic colors of the Park Street Bridge mural—a pop-up book of images representing the area’s vibrant history. Stretching from Brooklyn and spanning 1,100 feet over McCoys Creek and the rail lines, the bridge lands in LaVilla with the Downtown Jacksonville skyline shimmering in the distance.

Led by Overstreet Ducasse (*at left*), artists Grace Bio, Dustin Harewood, and Alexi McMonigle transformed the bridge’s concrete walls into their canvas, showcasing a living portrait of LaVilla’s history, culture, and memories. Months of meticulous, hand-painted work bring vivid colors and geometric shapes that pulse along the bridge, urging runners, walkers, and cyclists onward. The Ritz Theatre, Stanton High School marching band, jazz musicians, Gullah Geechee culture, and local railroad porters who played for the Negro League’s Red Caps leap from the walls—a long-anticipated masterpiece that makes the community’s stories tangible.

Generously underwritten by donors Rushton and Charles Callaghan, the Park Street Bridge mural does more than decorate—it welcomes all to step into Jacksonville’s story and enter a trail that celebrates community, culture, and the city itself.

Celebrate Trails Day

Groundwork Jacksonville welcomed the community to the Butterfly Garden near LaVilla Pond for our first Celebrate Trails Day, inviting families to connect with nature and the Emerald Trail. On Saturday, April 26 visitors enjoyed chalk art, yoga, walking tours, tree and pollinator talks, and a conversation with artist Overstreet Ducasse about the Park Street Mural. The afternoon culminated with a joyful butterfly release.

The event was made possible thanks to Baptist Health and the Urban and Community Forestry Program of the USDA Forest Service. Created by the Rails-to-Trails Conservancy, Celebrate Trails Day is an annual event that encourages people to get out in nature and experience their local trails.



StoryWalk®: Tales on the Trail

Among the blooms of the Butterfly Garden, families can stroll, read, and experience StoryWalk®. Twenty displays bring the pages of a children's picture book to life, inspiring movement, imagination, and early literacy. Funded by Baptist Health and created in partnership with the Library Foundation of Jacksonville and Groundwork Jacksonville, StoryWalk® offers new titles quarterly, curated by the Jacksonville Public Library. Combining literacy and nature, StoryWalk® is a wonderful reason for parents to bring their children to enjoy the Emerald Trail.

McCoys Creek

Flowing Back to Life

When Groundwork Jacksonville began planning the McCoys Creek restoration, the first step was listening.

For generations, residents along the creek faced repeated flooding—their homes and streets inundated whenever rains came. These conversations helped define the project's priorities: reduce flooding, restore the environment, and return McCoys Creek to the community as a safe, healthy, and beautiful neighborhood asset.

The reality of the creek's condition was sobering. Once described as a “hidden gem,” McCoys Creek had become buried, polluted, and overgrown—a channelized ditch that had lost both its function and its beauty. Through a remarkable partnership between the City of Jacksonville and Groundwork Jacksonville, with support of NOAA (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration), and the National Fish & Wildlife Foundation (NFWF), that has now changed.

Phase 1 of the McCoys Creek restoration has reimagined what was once a failing waterway into a natural, living system. The creek has been widened and re-directed, with new lagoons and tidal pools restoring natural flow, improving water quality, and creating habitat for fish and wildlife.

These engineering feats have also removed many homes from the flood zone, bringing back clean water, native vegetation, and a renewed sense of place. Trail and recreation design for Phase 1 is now complete and construction is expected to begin in early 2026. The transformation is truly breathtaking, with wide open views of a free-flowing creek.

More than restoring a waterway, McCoys Creek represents a point of neighborhood pride, revival of a community and a renewed future for generations to come.

Making Connections

Design of the 2.3-mile Riverside Link connecting Riverside to North Riverside and McCoys Creek continues. The initial 30% design was funded by Groundwork Jacksonville thanks to generous gifts from the Delores Barr Weaver Legacy Funds in conjunction with the J. Wayne Weaver Fund at The Community Foundation for Northeast Florida, and The James M. Cox Foundation.

This will be the first section constructed under a three-way partnership between Groundwork Jacksonville, the City of Jacksonville, and the Jacksonville Transportation Authority, funded by the \$132 million Local Option Gas Tax. Construction is projected to begin in 2027.

The Riverside Link will also connect to the Southbank Riverwalk and San Marco via the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) Shared-Use Path (SUP) across the Fuller Warren Bridge. Other features will include a half-mile spur along Riverside Avenue sponsored by the Rotary Clubs of Jacksonville, connecting the Artist Walk, skate park and Riverside Arts Market to Memorial Park on the St. Johns River.



Racing Ahead

VyStar Emerald Trail 5K/10K



The VyStar Emerald Trail 5K/10K has grown alongside the Trail itself—a reflection of transformation in motion. What began in 2020 with 150 runners and walkers weaving through early construction zones has become a sea of more than 800 participants filling the streets.

Over the years, the course has traversed through Downtown, the Shared-Use Path to San Marco, the Northbank Riverwalk, LaVilla Link and stretches of the S-Line. Each year the event allows participants to experience areas of Jacksonville they have never seen before.

Runners and walkers of all ages experience murals, native plantings, and educational signage—symbols of a city on the move. Each stride tells the story of progress, connection, and the vibrant spirit of Jacksonville taking shape.

Title sponsor VyStar Credit Union, presenting sponsor JTC Running, and race director 1st Place Sports have been pivotal in the creation, planning, and operation of the race from its very inception. While sponsorships have grown each year, Tom Bush Family of Dealerships and HDR have been loyal sponsors since the beginning. In its first five years from 2020-2024, the Emerald Trail 5K/10K has raised more than \$225,000 to support Groundwork Jacksonville.






Building Community

Listening & Learning

At the heart of all Groundwork Jacksonville's efforts—we're building community. The Emerald Trail isn't just a 30-mile route through Jacksonville—it's a once-in-a-generation opportunity shaped by the people who live, work, and gather along its path.

Since January, Groundwork Jacksonville along with our partners, the City of Jacksonville, the Jacksonville Transportation Authority and Volkert, have hosted a series of community meetings, neighborhood walks, focus groups and pop-up events for residents and stakeholders along Emerald Trail segments 4, 6, 7 and 8.

The Project Development & Environment (PD&E) Study is where the project moves from vision to reality—studying feasibility, exploring possible trail alignments, and, most importantly, listening.

Residents, business and property owners in Brentwood, Phoenix, North Riverside, Robinson's Addition, Durkeeville, New Town, College Gardens, Eastside and Springfield were able to see the proposed trail routes firsthand and share their input in real time.

Every idea, concern, question, and suggestion helps GWJax and our partners create a trail that meets neighborhood needs and contributes to the vision for their neighborhood.

Protecting Residents from Displacement

For many residents of our urban neighborhoods, home repairs can feel out of reach—leaving them vulnerable to climate impacts and displacement. The North Riverside Home Repair Program, created in partnership with the North Riverside Community Development Corporation (CDC), is changing that by helping long-time residents remain safe and comfortable in their homes.

This year, we completed repairs including new cool roofs, HVAC, electrical, plumbing and structural repairs on 11 homes, bringing the total to 39 homes repaired in just three years.

Repairs on 36 of those homes were funded through grants from Groundwork USA and the United Way of Northeast Florida. Inspired after watching a video highlighting homeowner Johnny Bryant's story whose home was completed in 2024, donors Rushton and Charles Callaghan generously funded repairs for three more homes which were completed this past summer.

What began as repairs has grown into resilience and an inspiration to others. Groundwork Jacksonville is working closely with residents of the Robinson's Addition neighborhood to create a similar program for those residents.

A Welcome Addition

Inspired by North Riverside's success, Robinson's Addition residents rallied to bring home repair opportunities to their neighborhood. GWJax, alongside partners Three Rivers Legal Services, Local Initiatives Support Corporation (LISC) Jacksonville, and Wealth Watchers, hosted a homeowner workshop that connected residents with vital resources for preserving homes and preparing for ownership. The event drew strong interest, with 30 families submitting forms for future repair support.

Beyond housing, the initiative is cultivating community—fostering leadership, unity, and momentum. During the MLK Day of Service, volunteers and residents planted accessible raised beds with herbs, pollinators, and winter crops. The garden now stands as a vibrant symbol of renewal, pride, and partnership, as Groundwork continues to help secure funding for long-term neighborhood growth.



Building Community

Stewardship, Education, and Shared Action

Community Restoration Environmental Stewardship Training (CREST) helps residents shape their futures and strengthen their neighborhoods. Created through Groundwork Jacksonville's engagement around the restoration of McCoys Creek, CREST has grown to include neighborhoods along Hogans Creek.

Supported by grants from Wells Fargo and National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), this intergenerational program empowers residents of all ages to become environmental stewards through workshops, creek cleanups, field trips, and hands-on projects like maintaining the North Riverside Daily Manna Community Garden.

It also encourages young and young-at-heart to reconnect with the outdoors—learning ecology and gardening, how to play golf, and exploring places like the Jacksonville Zoo and Botanical Gardens, White Oak Conservation, and the Jacksonville Arboretum & Botanical Gardens.

Beyond environmental education, CREST offers job opportunities such as being paid to complete neighborhood asset surveys, infrastructure assessments, and community mapping. Participants have also trained as Water Monitoring Technicians with the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, conducting creek sampling while earning stipends.

This unique program has gained attention from other organizations, both locally and beyond our region, as a model for intergenerational community stewardship.

CREST members are paid Water Monitoring Technicians, providing benchmark data that will be helpful in measuring the benefits of creek restoration in the future.

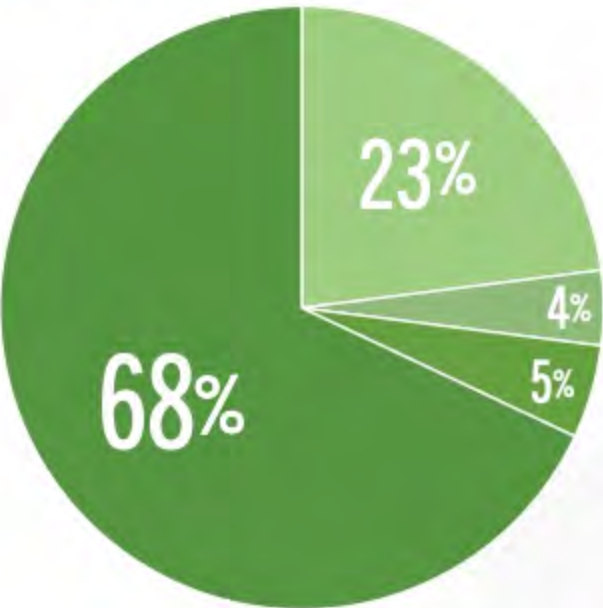

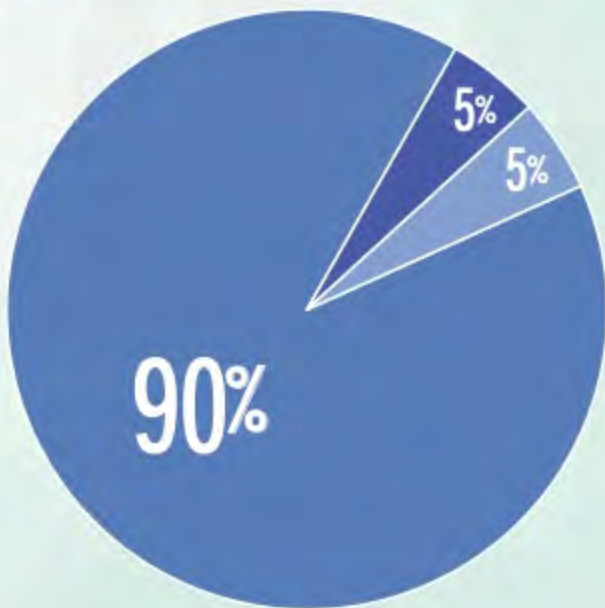
